In 2021, median salaries for workers with postgraduate qualifications were \$24,700 higher than those with undergraduate qualifications. Postgrad coursework graduates earned \$89,700, while postgrad research graduates earned an average wage of \$95,000.*

Short and sweet


Micro-credential

Though a mirco-credential isn't technically postgrad study, a quick two- or four-point micro-credential can be a great upskilling opportunity. What's more, you can then stack them towards a graduate certificate, graduate diploma or master's. Browse the full range of micro-credentials.

Single subject study

Dip your toe into university study or gain knowledge of a particular area to boost your career. Study a single subject to hone a new skill or get back into the groove of studying. You'll study the same course material that's in our degrees so you can apply for credit if you decide to study a related course. Explore Charles Sturt's single subject options.

How long does postgraduate study take?





A graduate certificate

A graduate certificate, or a grad cert for short, is all about giving you advanced skills and knowledge. They're ideal if you're already working in a field, or have qualifications in that particular area, but want to take your career up a notch.

Want to change careers? A grad cert is also perfect if you want to reskill by learning something completely different and move into a new occupation. We've all heard the word 'pivot' in terms of career flexibility. You can shift and adapt to the world around you very quickly by having a grad cert under your belt.

The benefits

- You can finish in just six months! Most Charles Sturt graduate certificates can be completed in half a year of full-time study.
- You can dip your toes into postgrad study and get a valuable qualification without committing to more lengthy study. But there's nothing stopping you from building on your qualification because a grad cert is...
- A great stepping stone to a graduate diploma or master's degree.

A graduate diploma

We like to call it a grad dip. It's a step up from your grad cert. A more specialised qualification, it's shorter to study than a master's. You can complete it in a year of full-time study.

Sometimes this qualification is available if you don't have a bachelor's degree but have relevant work experience.

The benefits

- · A grad dip is often the ideal qualification to transition into another career or get your foot on the next rung of the corporate ladder. It boosts your career credentials.
- More specialised than a grad cert, but shorter to complete than a master's, the grad dip is just right!
- Often a grad dip is what you'll need to gain professional accreditation.
- Want to go all the way? With a grad dip you're usually halfway to your master's and you'll get credit for it if you take the next step.

What is a master's degree?

A master's degree is a specialised qualification that can lead to career advancement and opportunities for further study (such as a doctorate/PhD).

When people consider doing a master's they have two choices: a master's by coursework or a master's by research. Most areas of study offer a master's by coursework, whereas a master's by research is a more specialised qualification. (We look into the master's by research a little further along; just keep reading!)

You can study your master's by coursework to delve into advanced critical analysis of your chosen subject and become the specialist you want to be.

The benefits

- Give yourself a competitive career edge with a master's degree in around 1.5 years of full-time study or three years part-time.
- For many of our master's degrees you can choose to exit early with a graduate certificate or diploma – and pick up where you left off when you return.
- Depending on your previous study and industry experience, you may be able to enrol directly into a master's degree.
- It's a stepping stone to a higher degree by research like a PhD.

Credit for prior learning

Keen to graduate as early as possible? You could with Charles Sturt's credit for prior learning. If you've studied before, or you have relevant work experience, you could receive <u>credit</u>.

Higher degree by research

A higher degree by research (HDR) includes a research master's and a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD). With these qualifications you'll change the world for the better! Add new knowledge to your area of interest through original research - make new discoveries and undertake groundbreaking work.

A Doctor of Philosophy is your chance to establish yourself as an expert in your field given it's the highest university qualification. Completing a PhD could pave the way for a rewarding career in research or academia anywhere in the world.

Over three or four years of full-time study you'll make an original and significant contribution to knowledge in your chosen discipline by conducting your own research and documenting your findings as a thesis or dissertation.

A master's by research includes undertaking a major research project, usually over a two-year period. You'll develop clinical research knowledge and skills to identify, investigate, manage and resolve problems in your chosen discipline. Joining our vibrant research community and having the support of renowned discipline experts will help you shape your research and make your own distinct contribution! Plus, a master's by research may also be a pathway to a PhD.



Start when you're ready

When you're ready, we're ready. At Charles Sturt we have multiple start dates across the year for you to begin the next step of your study journey. So you can find one that's right for you and your family. You can start most postgraduate courses in February, July or November. Select courses also have more start dates - we call them micro-sessions dotted through the year. So depending on your course, you could also choose to start in January, March, May, June, August or October.

Boost your soft skills

Managing work, family, and study isn't always going to be a walk in the park. But the soft skills you'll develop studying postgrad online will help you take on any challenge. Employers recognise the importance of the soft skills like time management, organisation and work ethic - it takes to juggle life, work and study.

Stay connect and be supported

If you think online study means doing it alone, think again. At Charles Sturt you'll have plenty of opportunities to build the deep connections that are central to your study. Connections with your tutors, lecturers, fellow students and industry that will last a lifetime.

Top tips for returning to study

Returning to study is an exciting and empowering time for you. Keen to know how to get the most out of your time as a postgraduate student at Charles Sturt? We've got the intel.

1. Be prepared for work-study balance

If you're going to nail your postgrad degree, you'll need to make a concerted effort to balance everything you have going on in your life. The best way to do this? Focus on organisation and time management. Plan your time. Studying when the kids are asleep. Listen to your lectures on your morning commute.

2. Make study a daily activity

Our advice? Make study a part of your day-to-day life. For instance, when there is a mid-session break, it's better to see this as study time without classes rather than a period in which to switch off. Even doing something administrative like checking that the format of your essay references is correct can help keep you 'tuned in' to your studies.

3. Be realistic with your expectations

Although we advocate for you to be proactive about balancing study and life, it's also important to be reasonable about what is doable in the time you have. Make sure you build in some down time. Life events have a funny way of popping up when you least expect it – and that's okay! The most important thing is to roll with it and not put too much pressure on yourself.

4. Set SMART goals (and reward yourself!)

One of the best ways to get back into study is to set yourself some good old-fashioned SMART goals. Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant and Time-bound – they'll become your new best friend.

SMART goals break work down into achievable steps. They can provide the clarity, focus and motivation you need to make things happen.

Extra study support and it won't cost you a thing!

Free intro to learning online

If you're new to online study or not quite sure how you'll go in an online environment, our Introduction to Learning Online module will set you up for success. As an online student, you'll automatically be enrolled in this free, short, online course. It's your chance to familiarise yourself with our learning platform, see how you'll complete and submit assessments, and get a feel for what studying online is really like. Best of all, it can be done before the session starts so you'll be ready

Study Link

Study Link will make your transition to university a little easier and give you the confidence to succeed. Study Link subjects are short, self-paced, non-credit bearing courses. You can brush up on writing, maths, statistics, science or information technology. Supported by a real person (your subject coordinator) you can work your way through at your own pace (take up to five months if you need).

"The advantage of the Study Link subjects for me was that I got to learn the online space before I started back at uni. I was also having a change of career, coming from an arts background and going into a science course. So, the Study Link subjects that I did in maths and chemistry gave me some grounding in the subjects that I was going to be doing in my university course. Intensive schools

Some subjects in your course may include a compulsory or optional intensive school. These can be online or on campus. They offer face-to-face or virtual lectures, tutorials and practicals to give you a deeper understanding of your subject. You'll meet with your lecturers and other students. To help you plan, intensive school dates for the following year are released annually in September. There are also intensive school scholarships available to help with the cost of travel and accommodation. Find out if your course has an intensive school by checking the Charles Sturt Handbook.

CSP

Some postgraduate courses have commonwealth supported places (CSP), which means the government pays a percentage of your fees.

Secure a CSP and you can apply for a HECS-HELP loan.

FEE-HELP

You may be eligible for FEE-HELP when you undertake one of our postgraduate courses.

FEE-HELP is a government loan that eligible students can use to pay their tuition fees, by deferring payment until you earn a certain amount.

Scholarships and grants

Did you know we offer more than \$3 million in scholarships and grants at Charles Sturt University? Don't rule yourself out of the running, there's an extensive range scholarships and grants available.

Many scholarships get left on the shelf because people assume they won't get one, so they don't even apply. Trust us, it's worth your while to apply - for as many as you can.

Get a discount


If you're a Charles Sturt alumni, you could receive a discount on the cost of your course.



Using My eQuals

To make things easy you can submit documents to us via My eQuals – which is a way you can share certified, digital versions of academic transcripts and graduation documents.

Go to your previous university's website for information about obtaining your records through My eQuals or visit myequals.edu.au

Remember, include your full name, applicant ID and date of birth with your eQual submissions – so we can attach it to the right application.

You can also submit transcripts and documents to us through the application portal, or email documents to admissions@csu.edu.au. These should be PDF files and include your full name, applicant ID and date of birth.

Just a note, please don't try to share documents using Google Drive.
