



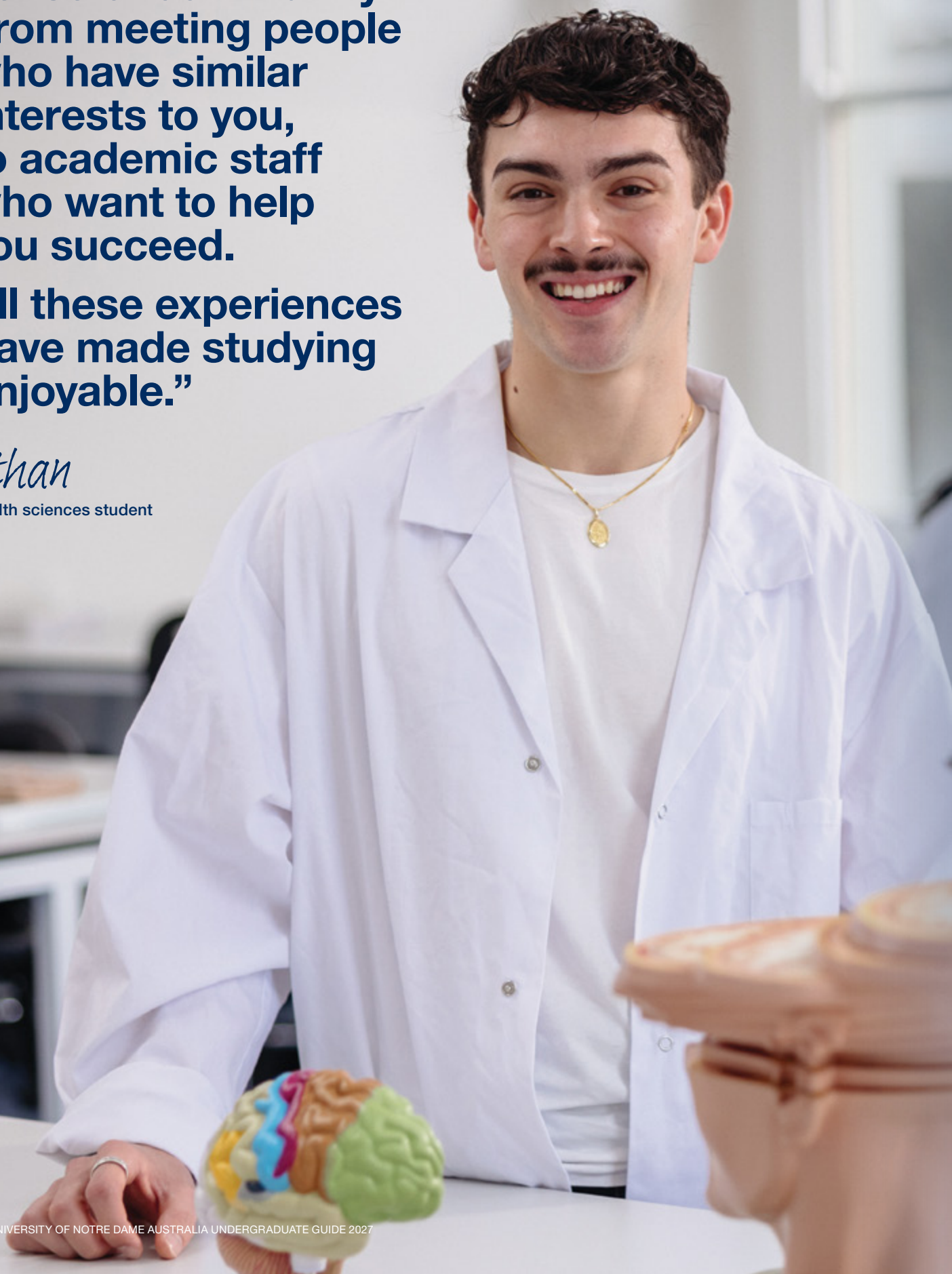

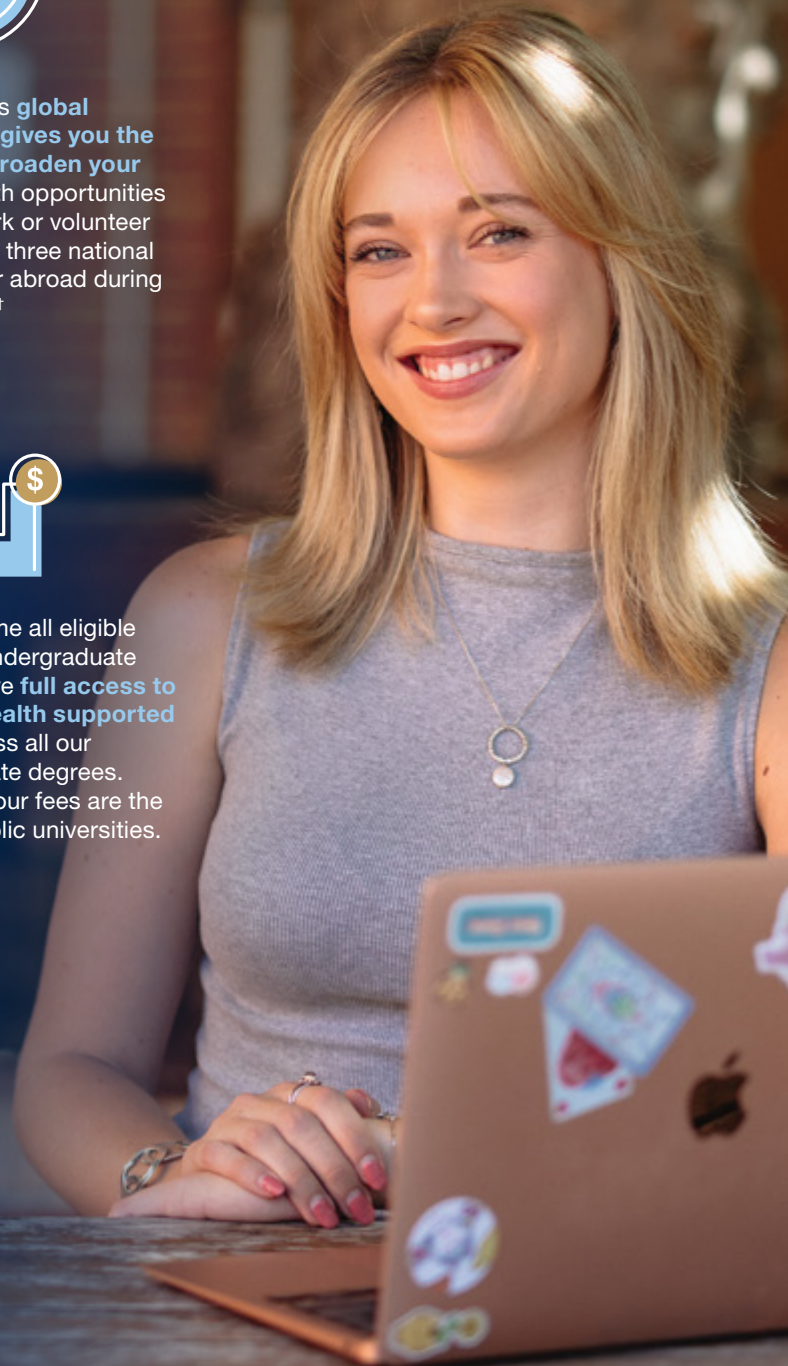

The Fremantle Campus is the foundation campus and is home to our School of Nursing & Midwifery, School of Health Sciences, School of Medicine, School of Arts & Sciences, School of Law & Business, School of Education and School of Philosophy & Theology.

On the north-western tropical fringe of Australia, Notre Dame's Broome Campus is located centrally on Yawuru Country in this culturally-diverse town, providing a rare opportunity for remote regional tertiary education in Australia.

Broome is known for its culture and arts, connecting people with the extensive Kimberley region. Within the town itself Notre Dame's Broome Campus is close to numerous focal points including:

- Broome Chinatown, home to Broome's rich multicultural pearling heritage
- Tourist opportunities including Indigenous cultural tours, art galleries, Malcolm Douglas Crocodile Park and the Broome Bird Observatory
- Broome Boulevard Shopping Centre and Paspaley Plaza with more than 50 shops combined
- Broome Recreation and Aquatic Centre
- Multiple restaurants and event venues to support a thriving arts and culture scene

Schools

The Broome Campus offers undergraduate programs in education, health sciences and commerce, along with an enrolled nurse articulation pathway through our Bachelor of Nursing. Vocational Education and Training (VET) programs are available in nursing and education support. The campus is also home to the Nulungu Research Institute and the Majorlin Kimberley Centre for Remote Health and offers a Commonwealth funded, end-to-end, rural graduate medical training pathway through the Kimberley Centre for Remote Medical Training.

Graduation Square is positioned at the heart of the campus and we also have a range of accommodation options available on site.

Transport

Central to all activities within the township, the Broome Campus is situated close to the main bus route and just a short walk or bike ride to anywhere within the town.

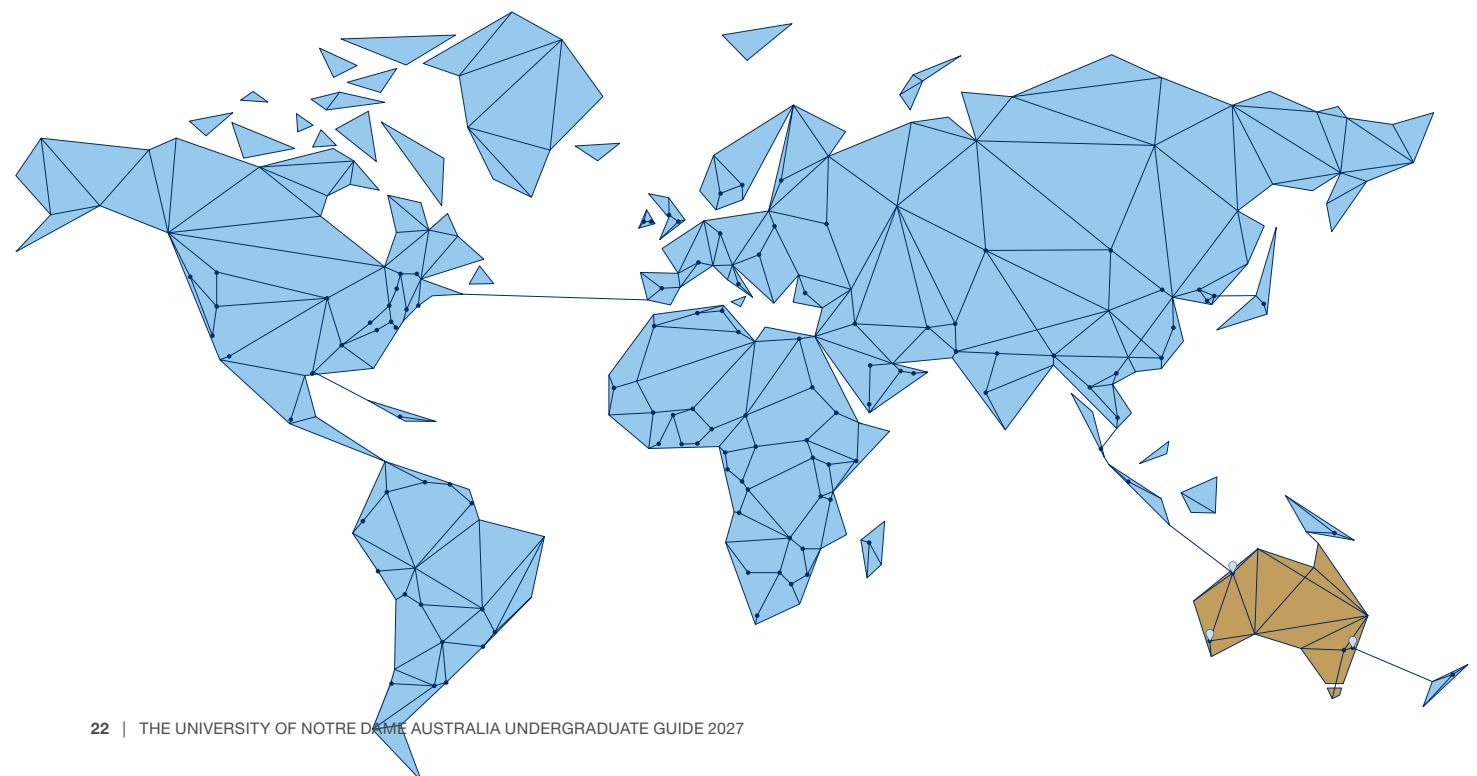

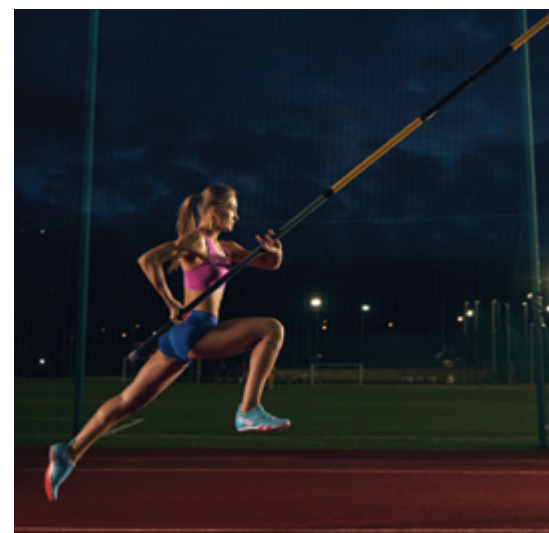

Our Vision: **Transformative Research**

Our learning and teaching is enriched by high quality research and scholarship. We want to create and transmit new knowledge, but we also commit to making a positive difference by undertaking research which addresses real-world issues and challenges, improving the lives of people in our communities.

Research institutes and centres

Institute for Ethics & Society

The Institute for Ethics and Society (IES) is a cross-disciplinary team of moral philosophers, bioethicists and social scientists conducting both pure and applied research. Based on the Sydney Campus, our research aims to improve contemporary social, political and individual life by exploring a range of subjects, including: how the virtues can strengthen civil society and support human flourishing; life, death and the care we receive; and the role of religion and spirituality in political and personal life. Our researchers have partnered with a wide range of industry, community and international partners, from schools and hospitals to grassroots political groups, religious organisations and other international research centres in ethics. The IES research focus areas are: Moral Philosophy and the Good Life; Bioethics and Healthcare Ethics; and Religion, Culture and Society.

Institute for Health Research

The Institute for Health Research (IHR) provides robust expertise in the design and analysis of complex health research to university researchers and those in the wider healthcare system. It also seeks to lead research programs that address the health needs of vulnerable individuals. Key areas of activity include palliative and aged care, prediction and prevention of cardiovascular diseases, social disadvantage and health, injury and health, data and method in health. Through numerous competitive grant-funded projects, supervision of postgraduate students and involvement in collaborative programs, the IHR offers a vibrant research culture in health and medical sciences that is closely aligned with the University's strategy and that strives to address the health priorities of the broader Australian community.

Nulungu Research Institute

The Nulungu Research Institute is framed by valuing and giving primacy to Aboriginal knowledge. Our research focuses on five core themes – Culture, Country and Language; Transformative Learning; Aboriginal Wellbeing; Sustainable Lifeways and Social Justice; and Policy, Practice and Evaluation. Based in Broome on our Campus of Reconciliation, our research is guided by our collective vision, 'to conduct collaborative research which is transformative, decolonising and of value to Aboriginal people with a focus on the Kimberley'.

A key feature of Nulungu's research profile is impactful, community-driven, cross-cultural and interdisciplinary collaborative projects with national and international academic institutions, teaching and research communities, government and industry.

Centre for the History of Philosophy

What does it mean to live a good life? How should we understand our place in the world? What can ancient wisdom offer us in a fragmented modern age?

The Notre Dame Centre for the History of Philosophy engages with enduring questions like these, which have shaped human thought across centuries. Our expertise spans the ancient, medieval and modern periods of the Western intellectual tradition and beyond, with particular strength in the history of philosophy across the three Abrahamic faith traditions – Judaism, Christianity and Islam. We host major research initiatives, offer unique teaching programs, host a vibrant program of academic and public events, collaborate with Australian and international partners, and mentor the next generation of scholars in the field. Our mission is to advance public and academic understanding of the philosophical traditions we inherit from the past and to show how they can help us cultivate flourishing lives and communities in the present.



Program Accreditation

Initial Teacher Education programs at the University of Notre Dame Australia are accredited by the Teacher Registration Board of Western Australia (TRBWA), and graduates are eligible for teacher registration in all Australian states and territories. The programs also meet all additional requirements for teacher registration required by the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA), ensuring that graduates are eligible for teacher registration in New South Wales.

NSW compulsory program requirements

Before you can undertake any professional experience in NSW schools, it is compulsory that you complete a Working With Children Check, an Education Criminal Record Check, Anaphylaxis e-training and Child Protection Awareness Training.

WA compulsory program requirements

Literacy and Numeracy Testing for Initial Teacher Education students (LANTITE)

In their first year, all students are required to attempt the national Literacy And Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education (LANTITE). Prior to being eligible for the final Internship professional placement in the program all students must successfully demonstrate the required minimum level of personal literacy and numeracy through meeting the standard on LANTITE. The test is administered externally by the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) (teacheredtest.acer.edu.au/register). Students are required to register with ACER and pay for the test.

Teacher performance assessment

All students are required to successfully complete the Graduate Teacher Performance Assessment in connection with their final teaching internship.

English language admission requirements

Education students who have English as an additional language and are admitted on the basis of an International English Language Testing System (IELTS) assessment, or an equivalent English language proficiency assessment, are only admitted if they have attained an overall IELTS (or equivalent) score of 8.0 (with no score below 7.0 in any of the four skills areas and a score of no less than 8.0 in speaking and listening).

Students will engage in a curriculum that has, at its core, patient safety and person-centred care. There will be a focus on critical thinking, clinical reasoning, critical reflection and the use of current evidence and research that are essential in the development of sound clinical judgements and decisions to practise safely in a complex health environment.

Person-centeredness, communication and cultural safety will be explored in both the theoretical and professional practice components of the program. There will also be a focus on the healthcare needs and approaches to culturally safe nursing care for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Students will explore current and emerging global, national and regional health priorities.

The curriculum adopts a cyclical learning model aimed at progressively building the capabilities of registered nurses.

The Bachelor of Clinical Exercise Physiology aims to provide highly trained accredited exercise physiologists (AEPs) to join the allied health workforce, providing clinical exercise services within clinical, community, workplace and sporting environments. Specifically, graduates may work with diverse populations including individuals living with chronic disease such as cardiovascular, metabolic, musculoskeletal, mental illness, disability and long-term sporting injuries. Acquiring in-depth knowledge and skills in core and emerging areas in the field, students will be equipped to practise in dynamic health environments within urban or rural settings.

The Bachelor of Physiotherapy focuses on the physiotherapist-client relationship and is highly practical in its orientation. As a student in physiotherapy, you undertake a comprehensive program, including specialised physiotherapy studies, behavioural and biological sciences, and clinical practice.

At Notre Dame, we explore every avenue of physiotherapy practice in your on-campus studies and clinical practice. Our program is unique and we provide a strong focus on preparation for clinical education. This prepares you for the formal clinical placements in year two and year three, then you progress to almost full-time clinical practice in your final year.

You will develop clinical assessment and intervention skills in laboratories, physio-dedicated labs and through exposure to patients in physiotherapy practices, hospitals or community health settings in both urban and rural centres.

Upon graduation, you are eligible for registration as a physiotherapist with the Australian Health Practitioner Registration Agency (Ahpra) and full membership of the Australian Physiotherapy Association.

Tertiary Pathway Program

The Tertiary Pathway Program (TPP) is designed to help if you have not met the requirements for entry into the University's undergraduate programs. Following successful completion of the TPP, you may gain entry to complete an undergraduate program on either the Fremantle or the Sydney Campus in the following areas:*

- Arts & sciences
- Business
- Education
- Health sciences
- Nursing
- Philosophy & theology

If you have strong academic results but do not meet the direct entry requirements into undergraduate studies, you may be eligible for an intensive on-campus four-week pathway program over the Summer Term.

TPP Intensive is offered in Fremantle and Sydney in the Summer Term over four weeks. Students will complete two courses over two weeks and the following two courses over the following two weeks. Students must attend tutorials every day for the four weeks.

General pathway

To gain entry to most arts, sciences, business, education, philosophy and theology programs, you will complete the following four courses:

- Academic Writing
- Research Skills & Information Literacy
- Essential Mathematics
- Communication Skills

Nursing and health sciences pathway

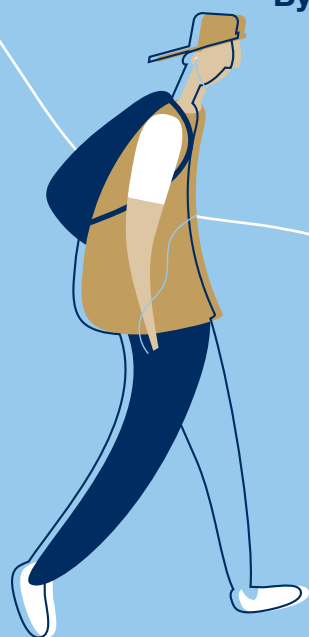

ADMISSIONS

Notre Dame University's admissions process

At Notre Dame, we want everyone to have the opportunity to pursue tertiary study. As a result, we offer multiple pathways for entry to the University as follows:

a) Recent Secondary Education. This applies to:

- Students who are currently in Year 12; or
- Applicants who have completed Year 12 or equivalent within the last two years.

b) Higher Education. This applies to studies undertaken with a tertiary institution, including bridging or enabling programs.

c) Vocational Education and Training (VET). This includes studies undertaken with an accredited provider such as a TAFE or a Registered Training Organisation (RTO).

d) Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT).

e) Other ATAR equivalent. This includes secondary studies (Year 12, or equivalent), completed more than two years prior.

f) Relevant work and life experience.

Adjustment factors

Notre Dame's admissions process goes beyond a single score and, like the Notre Dame study experience, is focused on the whole person. For ATAR students, this includes adjustment factors which will be included to create your Selection Rank.

Notre Dame's adjustment factors seek to address adversity faced by students, reward exceptional performance and recognise extracurricular activity, as well as allow consideration for specific (disadvantaged) cohorts and priority groups. They are designed to ensure every student has the opportunity to achieve their goal of gaining entry to – or pursuing study at – Notre Dame.

Adjustment factors are additional points which are added to a student's ATAR (or equivalent) to create their Selection Rank. Applicants can receive up to 5 adjustment factors (points) from each of the below categories, to a maximum of 10 in total.

Adjustment factors may include:

Individual factors (1–5 adjustment factor points): We consider the whole person and recognise non-academic achievements, such as personal qualities, work and life experience and contribution to community life.

Equity adjustments (up to 10 adjustment factor points): Students who have experienced significant educational or other disadvantage due to circumstances beyond their control, or live in an area classified as being of socio-economic disadvantage, may qualify for equity adjustments.

Location-based adjustments (up to 10 adjustment factor points): This applies to current and recent school leavers who live or attend school in designated areas as follows:

- If the school you attended is classified as being of socio-educational disadvantage, you will qualify for adjustment factors
- If you attended a school in an area which is classified as rural or regional, you will qualify for adjustment factors

International applicants

The process of applying to study at Notre Dame for an international applicant is different from that of a domestic applicant. If you are an international student looking for program and application information, please visit notredame.edu.au/international

Subject performance (either 2, 3 or 5 adjustment factor points): Current and recent school leavers who achieve outstanding results in their school subjects will receive adjustment factor points, depending on the level of results achieved.

Elite athletes and artistic performers (5 adjustment factor points): Athletes who compete at – and performers who have had success at – a state, national or international level may be eligible for adjustment factor points.

University priority groups (5 adjustment factor points): Notre Dame recognises Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, along with Australian Defence Force (ADF) personnel, as priority groups who may be eligible for adjustment factor points as part of their application.

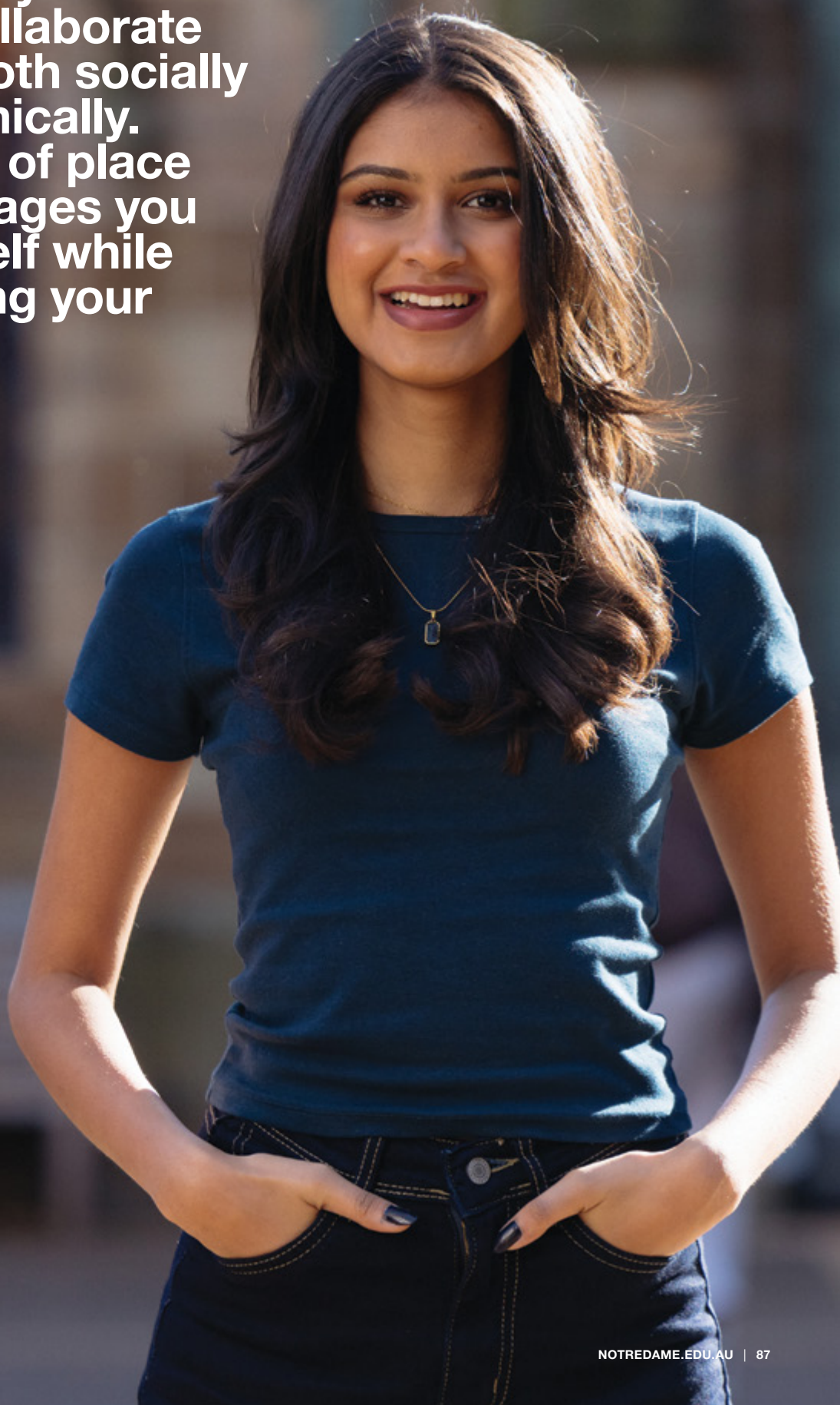

Fee information

Investing in your future

Notre Dame is committed to making all its programs as affordable and accessible as possible, with its fee structure reflecting this goal.

Commonwealth supported places and HECS-HELP

All undergraduate programs offer Commonwealth supported places (CSP). Students allocated a CSP will have a portion of their tuition fees paid by the Australian Government.

Australian citizens, holders of permanent humanitarian visas and eligible New Zealand citizens who are in a CSP are able to access HECS-HELP to defer all or part of their tuition fees through an Australian Government loan which is paid back when the borrower's income reaches a certain threshold.

Permanent residents and New Zealand citizens who are not eligible for HECS-HELP can still apply for a CSP to receive the lower fee rate but must pay their student contribution amount in full by the first course Census Date.

How fees are calculated

Students who have a CSP have their fees calculated against Fee Bands set by the Australian Government. The cost of a course will depend on the Fee Band that the course belongs to. For example, a student enrolled in a Bachelor of Secondary Education will study education courses in Band 1 but may also wish to study business courses that come under Band 4 and, as such, cost more than courses in Band 1.

How do I apply for a Commonwealth supported place (CSP)?

You don't need to apply separately for a CSP, eligible students are offered one automatically. After you accept your program offer, you'll receive an email from the Australian Government with a link to complete the electronic Commonwealth Assistance Form (eCAF). You must complete this form before enrolling in your courses. As part of the eCAF, you'll need to provide your Tax File Number (TFN) and Unique Student Identifier (USI). For more information and the latest eligibility criteria, visit studyassist.gov.au.

Pre-university program

Our Tertiary Pathway Program (TPP) provides a supported entry into university study. Eligible students can study fee-free under the Australian Government's FEE-FREE Uni Ready (FFUR) initiative. If you secure a Commonwealth supported place (CSP) and complete the required eCAF, you won't pay any tuition fees, your costs are fully covered by the Australian Government. You can learn more about FFUR at studyassist.gov.au.

Additional study costs

The additional costs of study will vary from student to student. Additional costs include textbooks, uniforms, accommodation, public transport, photocopying, stationery and food.

Financial assistance

Austudy, ABSTUDY and Youth Allowance schemes are operated by the Australian Government and provide financial assistance to eligible students. For further information, please contact Centrelink on 13 24 90 (Youth Allowance and Austudy), or 1800 132 317 (ABSTUDY) or visit servicesaustralia.gov.au.

Student services amenities fee

In addition to tuition fees, you are also required to pay a student services and amenities fee (SSAF). This fee will be used to enhance the student experience and improve non-academic services and amenities for all students – from sports and recreation to financial advice and student wellbeing.

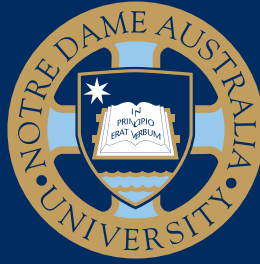
